PROGRAM DIRECTOR'S REPORT

grunt gallery comes to the end of its 30th anniversary BREW – it's been a very exciting program of events. A series of parties, events and projects have animated our year, building on our successful exhibition and archive program: our birthday party, Growler, the Founders Dinner, DISGRUNTLED: Other Art eBook, the Archives Dinner, Kitchen, a new installation by Julie Feyrer based in the grunt archive, the exhibitions Mainstreeters and Eraser Street, based in Vancouver art history and social history, and community practice projects FUTURE/LOSS by Zoe Kreye and Shako Club by Cindy Mochizuki. Strong solo exhibitions included The Book of Jests by Hyung Min Yoon, Crossed by Ahmad Tabriz and curated by Makiko Hara, Chopper by Brandon Vickerd, Diptychs by Mark Igloliorte and ending with ARCTICNOISE a Geronimo Inutiq's new installation opening during ISEA in August.

Engagement outside of our immediate community has been incredible; programming included conferences, panels, a Kickstarter campaign, neighbourhood walks and a drag ball. Overall, it's been an excellent 30th anniversary program by curator Vanessa Kwan that engaged on so many levels.

Administratively, it's been a strong year as well. Early in 2014 we received the Production Spaces Grants for Mount Pleasant award from the City of Vancouver and moved into 2015 mortgage-free. We also received \$240,000 towards a capital fund to help support our future. This year our endowment at the Vancouver Foundation—the grunt gallery Legacy Fund— grew to almost \$600,000 and continues to provide important funding towards our programming. Additionally, we paid off the deficit from our 2011 media lab renovation, completing the year both mortgage- and debt-free.

So at 30, grunt is stable and thinking towards our future. With changes in the ways artistic practice is developing and funder models, we move forward to an unsure future, but confident as well in the strength of our programming and operations. The added support of archivist Dan Pon and two curators, Vanessa Kwan and Tarah Hogue, we have been able to achieve extensive program and administration advances.

Somewhere in the middle of this we took the time to work with the community in saving Al Neil and Carole Itter's cabin from Burrard Inlet. With the help of Barbara Cole from Other Sites, Esther Rausenberg of Creative Cultural Collaborations with support from Michael Jackson, our project manager from PM Volunteers, and logistical and financial support from Polygon Homes, we were able to move the cabin to the Canexus plant in North Vancouver. This small cabin is the last of the original squatters' cabins along the shore and the team is working with Heritage Planner Hal Kalman and Heritage conservator Andrew Todd to remediate the cabin for heritage and artistic use.

Thank you for celebrating thirty years of grunt gallery with us, we look forward to many future anniversaries and milestones.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

If grunt gallery was a bottle of wine, I suspect that many wine connoisseurs and sommeliers will say that 2014-2015 was a "fine and distinguished year."

As an executive member of the Board of Directors, I can confidently state that all of us at the grunt are proud of its "full-bodied" and "complex" bouquet – one that describes the diversity and depth of activities accomplished in our 30th anniversary year, as outlined by Glenn Alteen in his Executive Director's Report. I surely will not do justice to the richness of experience and reverberations of energy produced from these collection of events, by simply listing them here; but rather, I would like to take the time to reflect on the year through my personal lens, having somewhat of a bird's-eye-view of the activities at the grunt by serving as the Chair of the Board this past year.

To continue with the Dionysian trope, grunt tastes "earthy" - like a good cabernet franc or malbec. It has been earthy from its very beginning 30 years ago, and 30 years later, the "after-taste" of grunt continues to remain down-to-earth, and accessible. My single most common experience, in attending openings and events at the grunt over the past few years, has been hearing the comment from visitors that "the grunt feels so welcoming and inviting." This is true, whether or not you are an "old stock Canadian," or an "old stock grunter-for-life."

I feel that the board has been challenged positively to grow and mature as a team, by the leadership and the direction of the staff, and rose to the occasion in our supportive role. The positive experience of raising over \$10,000 for the Kickstarter campaign wouldn't have been possible without the staff's leadership, encouragement, and implementation of the organizational structure of the campaign to ensure a successful outcome. I sense that there is much more that we can achieve together imminently. And it belabors the obvious to say that we are deeply grateful to all of the nearly 200 donors that contributed to the campaign.

Ultimately, the grunt is about forming, and furthering and nurturing all of these individuals and our mutual relationships, not primarily as funders and donors, but as grunters, and the grunt community members.

To each and every one of you – including our hyper-competent members of the staff, thoughtful and hard-working board, our energetic volunteers, our talented contributing artists, our generous patrons, and funding bodies – congratulations on a fine and distinguished year, and thank you.

ARTIST RESIDENCIES

Kitchen | Julia Feyrer October – December, 2014

A 3-month long residency with artist Julia Feyrer within our archive, Media Lab and main gallery spaces. Beginning with the idea of "The Kitchen"—at times the creative and social heart of grunt gallery — Feyrer created a new installation and media commission that incorporated elements of grunt's rich archive of performance and exhibition documentation, as well as the lesser known and harder-to-trace narratives of social connection and creative format that have informed this institution.

FutureLoss | Zoe Kreye January – April, 2015

Over the course of 12 weeks, the artist directly engaged with shop owners, organizers and residents in discussions around what it means to hold space in a shifting landscape. Space, on this strip of Main Street and in this city, is currency, and Kreye's practice reaches through the overarching narratives of real estate, gentrification and speculation to consider the poetics of an individual's connection to place.

Shako Club | Cindy Mochizuki May – July, 2015

A two month long residency project with artist, Cindy Mochizuki, and created in collaboration with members of Tonari Gumi (Vancouver's Japanese Community Volunteers Association). Participants worked with themes of wellness, care, memory and food, planning several bento box meals which were later disseminated to local Vancouver residents over a series of lunches in July. Through this simple—yet deeply collaborative—system of exchange, the notion of caring community gently extends, through food and sociability, into the wider community's connection to place.

PROJECTS

Social Objects: grunt Coasters & Growlers by Sonny Assu & Lorna Brown

October 2014

Social Objects launched through grunt gallery as part of a program called "Brew." Artists Sonny Assu and Lorna Brown have created "social objects" – artist editions that are designed to circulate in the social spaces such as bars or restaurants in Mount Pleasant.

November 2014

To further activate the Social Objects "Brew" project, the coasters were presented at four different local restaurants along Main Street on a weekly basis throughout November. (Nov 3 - Cascade Room; Nov 10 - Charlie's; Nov 17 - El Camino's; Nov 24 - The Union).

Disgruntled: Other Art eBook April 2015

Disgruntled: Other Art is a compilation of texts written over the past thirty years by curators and artists for grunt gallery. Ranging in style from critical essay to storytelling and poetry, these texts describe, discuss and dissect some of the vast number of exhibitions and performances produced at the gallery.


